# Guidelines for Part Time Candidates M. A. Degree in Women's Studies San Diego State University 

In order to accommodate students whose work and/or domestic obligations make part-time pursuit of the MA degree desirable, the Women's Studies Department may admit a limited number of highly-qualified applicants (no more than three per year) who will pursue their degrees on a part-time basis.

Part-time students are expected to acquire the MA within four years, proceeding at approximately half the pace of full-time students, who generally finish their studies in 2 years. Students should plan to take no fewer than six courses in the first two years of pursuing the degree, and preferably four courses in the first year. Progress toward the degree will be evaluated each year by the Graduate Advisor and the committee chair.

Applicants for the part-time option should be aware of the following considerations:

- Only full-time students are eligible for graduate assistantships.
- A course load of 6 or more units may be necessary to receive and to retain financial aid (it is the student's responsibility to check with Financial Aid office about the particular provisions of each grant).
- Out-of-state and international students are required to enroll in 10 units of coursework each semester to receive non-resident tuition waivers.
- Students who are accepted within the part-time track are likely, over the long term, to pay higher fees for their degrees, due to the fee structure of the university (3 units cost as much as 6 units each semester).

Students formally enrolled in the part-time track will be assigned a faculty mentor, who will oversee, with the Graduate Advisor, course selection and progress toward the degree. The Department will also offer structured opportunities, through the Feminist Colloquia, workshops, and other department events, for full and part-time students to develop a sense of community.

The following template is designed to serve as a guide to help part-time students move through the program in a logical sequence. Students may be able to satisfy program requirements more quickly, depending upon the number of courses in which they enroll in each semester. The Graduate Advisor and Department Chair may authorize a change in this program, as needs arise, in accordance with departmental guidelines.
